In Person Delivery Details:

3. **Grading:**

Each piece of work (reports, assignments, quizzes, midterm exam(s) or final examination) submitted by the student will be assigned a grade. The student's grade for each component listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade.

The conversion between a percentage grade and letter grade is as follows.

Grading

To pass the course, it is necessary to get an aggregate percentage score on the three exams of 50.00% or over.

Labs are graded using a two-stage 0-1-2 scale that will be explained in more detail in the labs. The aggregate lab results will then be converted to a single percentage score. Each exam will be assigned a percentage score. The student's average percentage score for the four components listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade. The conversion between course percentage and letter grade is given below; the Instructor may uniformly lower (but not raise) the numerical cutoffs for the different letter grades depending on a number of factors (difficulty of exams, how hard the marking is, etc.).

This course will have a final exam that will be scheduled by the Registrar. [The Final Examination Schedule](#) will be published by the Registrar's Office approximately one month after the start of the term. The final exam for this course will be designed to be completed within 2 hours.

The final exam will be administered using an on-line platform. Per section [G.5](#) of the online Academic Calendar, timed final exams administered using an on-line platform, such as D2L, will be available on the platform. **Due to the scheduling of the final exams, the additional time will be added to the end of the registrar scheduled synchronous exam to support students. This way, your exam schedule accurately reflects the start time of the exam for any synchronous exams. E.g. If a synchronous exam is designed for 2 hours and the final exam is scheduled from 9-11am in your student centre, the additional time will be added to the end time of the synchronous exam. This means that if the exam has a 1 hour buffer time, a synchronous exam would start at 9 am and finish at 12pm. - updated April 6, 2021**

Course Outcomes:

- Apply concepts from mineralogy to identify and classify metamorphic rocks and their textures and structures in hand sample
- Apply concepts from optical mineralogy to identify metamorphic minerals using the petrographic microscope
- Rationalise the development of metamorphic mineral assemblages in terms of variations in bulk composition and metamorphic grade
- Interpret metamorphic phase diagrams for different bulk compositions to constrain the pressure-temperature (P-T) conditions and P-T path of metamorphic rocks
- Apply concepts from geochemistry (esp. thermodynamics) to estimate pressure-temperature conditions of metamorphic rocks using geothermobarometry
- Predict the type of tectonic setting that different mineral assemblages represent
- Articulate how metamorphic petrology is a unique and irreplaceable tool in understanding Earth evolution and processes
